What is school like in Kenya?

- At school, some children may be different ages but in the same year group.

Weather and climate

Kenya lies on the **Equator** so the **climate** is hot, sunny and dry most of the year. There are hot dry deserts in the **north** and it is hot and humid in the **west**. However the **highlands** are cool. In fact, Mount Kenya is high enough to be covered in **snow** all year round.

Where is Kenya?

- Located in east Africa.
- Population of around 44 million.
- The capital city is Nairobi.
- Mombasa, situated on the coast, is one of Kenya's largest cities.
- The Tana river is the longest river in Kenya.
- Mount Kenya is the highest mountain (5200m).
- Kenya's coastline is on the Indian Ocean.
- Swahili and English are the official languages.
